
KW had a wonderful time making their outdoor Friend-o-Meter. The Friend-o-Meter is a visual tool that we use to help students assess how they are feeling in their friendships. Like a thermometer, the Friend-o-Meter indicates whether a friendship is in the healthy (green) or unhealthy (red) zone.



Friendship Fact #1: No Friendship is Perfect reminds students that it is normal and okay for a friendship to sometimes dip into the red zone. The key, however, is that they take action to get the friendship back into the green zone. The goal with all relationships is that they are in the green zone MOST of the time!

Congratulations to our two Premier's Debating Challenge teams who are proving to be strong, competent opponents.




Curriculum Information

When I was in primary school, I learnt that there are 26 letters that make up the English alphabet, consisting of 5 vowels and 21 consonants. What I didn't learn until I became a teacher is that there are 43 sounds (phonemes) that make up Australian English. Recognising these sounds is a crucial part of how we now teach children to read and spell. At its simplest, reading is taking the letters on a page and translating them into the sounds we hear in words. Writing is the reverse, converting the sounds we hear in words into letters on a page.

If knowledge about phonemes is new to you, as it was to me as an adult, then you may be interested to learn more to be able to support your child at home. Included in the Forest Focus this week is a table of 'Chants and Actions' that covers all the sounds we teach in kindergarten with the chants and actions we use to help children remember them. Being able to segment words into their sounds is an essential skill in learning to read and spell.
